


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## **IR Receiver Modules for Remote Control Systems**




### **DESCRIPTION**

This IR receiver series is optimized for long burst remote control systems in different environments. The customer can chose between different IC settings (AGC variants), to find the optimum solution for his application. The higher the AGC, the better noise is suppressed, but the lower the code compatibility.

The devices contain a PIN diode and a preamplifier assembled on a lead frame. The epoxy package contains an IR filter. The demodulated output signal can be directly connected to a microprocessor for decoding. These components have not been qualified to automotive specifications.



### **BLOCK DIAGRAM**










Fig. 1 - Output Delay and Pulse-Width






Fig. 2 - Pulse-Width vs. Irradiance in Dark Ambient








Fig. 4 - Pulse-Width vs. Irradiance in Dark Ambient



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


Fig. 5 - Frequency Dependence of Responsivity




Fig. 6 - Sensitivity in Bright Ambient




Fig. 7 - Sensitivity vs. Supply Voltage Disturbances




Fig. 8 - Max. Envelope Duty Cycle vs. Burst Length




Fig. 9 - Sensitivity vs. Ambient Temperature





Fig. 10 - Relative Spectral Sensitivity vs. Wavelength



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


Fig. 11 - Horizontal and Vertical Directivity




Fig. 12 - Sensitivity vs. Supply Voltage



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## SUITABLE DATA FORMAT

This series is designed to suppress spurious output pulses due to noise or disturbance signals. The devices can distinguish data signals from noise due to differences in frequency, burst length, and envelope duty cycle. The data signal should be close to the device's band-pass center frequency (e.g. 38 kHz) and fulfill the conditions in the table below.

When a data signal is applied to the product in the presence of a disturbance, the sensitivity of the receiver is automatically reduced by the AGC to insure that no spurious pulses are present at the receiver's output.

Some examples which are suppressed are:

- DC light (e.g. from tungsten bulbs sunlight)
- · Continuous signals at any frequency




Fig. 13 - IR Disturbance from Fluorescent Lamp With Low Modulation




Fig. 14 - IR Disturbance from Fluorescent Lamp With High Modulation

- · Strongly or weakly modulated patterns from fluorescent lamps with electronic ballasts (see Fig. 13 or Fig. 14)
- 2.4 GHz and 5 GHz Wi-Fi


